

Porsche 911 Turbo S to Debut in Geneva

First new 911 Turbo S in five years will provide 530 hp and 24 mpg

ATLANTA - February 8, 2010 - Taking its place at the top of the Porsche 911 line-up, the new 911 Turbo S will deliver exclusivity along with 530 hp, 516 lb ft of torque and an impressive 24 miles per gallon highway. It will be available in both Coupe and Cabriolet form, with the range-topping 911 to feature a remarkable list of standard equipment including the seven-speed PDK, PCCB brakes, Sport Chrono Package Turbo and more. The 2011 911 Turbo S Coupe and Cabriolet will be available in May, 2010 with a MSRP of \$159,100 and \$170,200 respectively.

Don't forget to drive your Porsche, as we often have parking lot 'tech and admiration' sessions.



it is a great time and you should start thinking about signing up! If track days aren't your thing you should still make the trip up and hang out and check out the cars.


The monthly meetings have had great attendance and are also a good chance to get out and meet with other like minded people so if you have never attended you should plan on doing so.



Interesting past few days. Won't go into details here.

Last week Betty and I went to downtown Louisville (and you know how I don't like downtown) to see the Titanic exhibit. We found a parking place in front of the Frasier Intl. History Museum (luck was with me). We entered the Frazier and told the receptionist that we were here to see the Titanic exhibit. She said that we were in the wrong place, the Titanic was at the Science center one block over. But she did mention that they had the WWII '48 local stories that changed the world' exhibit and it was dollar day. We elected to see the WWII exhibit and see the Titanic exhibit later in the day.

The WWII exhibit was fascinating, personal stories from veterans and other locals that lived thru that era. Then we walked to the Science Museum to see the Titanic exhibit, a bit pricey but also interesting. Upon entering, our 'ticket' was a replica of a Titanic boarding pass with the name of a passenger on the back with a brief bio of that person. This gives a personal touch to the artifacts, mostly glassware and pots and pans and other items picked up from the ocean floor each with a brief description and story. There were also some personal items traceable to actual passengers. At the end of the tour there was a big wall chart with the first, second and third class passengers listed, separated by 'saved' and 'lost'. We looked up our passenger to see if they were saved or lost. Betty's passenger was rescued but mine didn't make it. Most that were lost died from hypothermia from the very cold water and didn't drown.

I saw in the CJ that they are unpacking the King Tut exhibit. As I read the text I got the impression that the exhibits are repos and not the actual items. Makes sense as the actual items are 'priceless' and too pricey to just truck around the country. The exhibit was recently in Indianapolis but I couldn't find an excuse to make the trip.

The cabriolet is coming along as is the '51 motor. Finding parts for the early cars is a real adventure.

An Introduction to Driver's Education (DE) for Porsche Owners (Part I of II)

When you mention you are heading to "driver's ed" it makes it sound as if you are back in high school or, if you reside in a state that mandates it, to a punishment school for those who have been ticketed for speeding.

Registration and Technical Inspection

The registration itself is a bit daunting. You are usually asked to complete registration, a medical form and a technical inspection form for your car. The registration will ask for general information about you and your car, including your address and the make and model of your automobile. FYI, when they ask whether you are "novice, intermediate or advanced," they are not asking for your opinion of your driving skills. You may think you rule the roadways, but if you've never

done a DE before, you are a novice. And even if you have done a few DEs, you are still a novice. And once you have done a few, you will understand why being moved to the intermediate group too early is not always a good thing (more on that later).

Completing items on the tech inspection form may initially seem like a headache, but you should consider it insurance for when you push your car's handling, brakes and tires to the limit. Prior to the event, you should take your car to a mechanic for a thorough inspection. When you arrive at the track, your car will be inspected once again and if all things are not found to be up to par, you won't be allowed to run.

If you don't own a helmet (and most novices don't), you may ask the DE organizers to hold a "loaner" helmet for you. Eventually, if you decide DEs are something you'd like to do often, you may consider purchasing a helmet for yourself. Your decision may be hastened if you do an August event and borrow a sweaty, manly smelling helmet.

Arrive a bit Early

Arriving at the track the first time is both exciting and intimidating. DE events usually ask that you show up early for setup, inspections and a possible classroom session prior to your time behind the wheel. When you arrive, other drivers will be filing in. Some drive up in cars that look like yours, and others will arrive towing race-ready vehicles. The parking lot at my first DE was a beautiful sight, full of Porsches old and new.

After you arrive and park, you'll register and receive your instructor assignment and event schedule. Your instructor serves as your event guide, and as such, it is important that you feel comfortable with him/her. Instructors ride with you in the car and offer you level-appropriate feedback to help you become a better driver. If you do anything at your DE, it should be to listen to your teacher. Some of the suggestions offered by the teacher may seem senseless at the time. The instructor will encourage you to go faster, brake later, turn later, etc. If you develop trust in your instructor, following his/her advice will yield surprising results and a thrilling experience.

Check your Ego at the Door


On that note, let me stress that the worst thing you can bring with you to a DE event, be it novice or advanced, is an ego. If you're there to hear praise on your driving skills, or to drive aggressively to prove how fast you are, you won't learn much. At best you'll annoy those around you; at worst you could hurt your fellow drivers. Leave your ego behind and you'll leave the track a better driver.

In part II of this post we'll explore what happens after registration and tech inspection and go through an actual day at a DE event.
